A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

After assuming the office of OOTC President, my first reaction was that I had obviously taken on a task that I knew absolutely nothing about. Thank goodness for Bert, W5JNK, the OOTC Executive Secretary, and Lee, W9MOL, the OOTC Treasurer! They have been leading me every step of the way.

One of the first duties presented was the forwarding of a scholarship fund check to be awarded to some deserving young "HAM". That spurred me to find out what the scholarship was about and how it was awarded.

The Foundation for Amateur Radio, Inc. (FAR) acts as manager for the scholarships. FAR's purpose is to help the Amateur Radio community by providing for education, and technical and advisory guidance. One method used is to award scholarships. The FAR Scholarship Committee manages the award process and it is responsible for the administration of some fifty-four Amateur Radio-related scholarships provided by individuals and Amateur Radio clubs from across the nation. FAR states that "This is the largest such program related to Amateur Radio in the country."

Scholarship applications are available to all licensed Amateur Radio operators worldwide proposed by a member of a sponsoring organization, such as OOTC. The amounts available vary from \$500 to \$2,500.

OOTC has been making scholarships available for several years based upon the availability of income earned on member donations invested in a money market and CD fund. The amount has been \$600 annually. We are now considering the feasibility of increasing this to \$1000 in view of rising interest rates.

The importance of contributions to our Scholarship Fund by individual members is significant. Since July 2004 until the end of January 2006 there have been twenty-two individuals contributing to the OOTC Scholarship fund. Our hats are off to them and we would like to publicly thank them for their support.

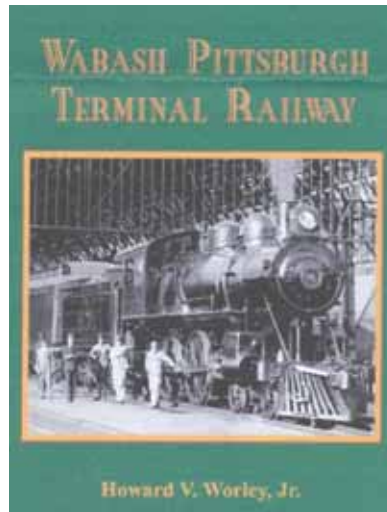

ADAH M. ELLIOTT, W9RTH, #3034, SILENT KEY DEC. 10, 2005

I first met Adah in 1958 when she gave Mike, John and I our novice exams. I had heard much about Adah, W9RTH, because she was well known locally, in Indiana as well as the US.

Adah got her ham license in Feb. of 1941. She often told me how she and her husband Dick both worked to get their license. The nearest place one could take the FCC exam in those days was in Chicago at the FCC field office. They both worked and had a family, so everyone had to pile in the family car and make a late drive to get there and take the code and theory exam.

Adah got her license before Dick and he had built a little CW rig for her and had it ready when she got home the day her license came. One had to wait for the FCC to mail your license and it could be from 8 to 10 weeks before it came, so excitement ran high while one waited, wondering what the call might be. Her first contact was on 160 meters and was answered by a ham in Indianapolis where they lived.

December 7, 1941 shut down the ham bands so Adah had to wait until they were open to ham again. Right after WWII women with ham licenses organized a national organization known as Young Ladies Radio League, YLRL, and Adah was one of the first to belong. She was instrumental in organizing HAWK - Hoosier Amateur Women Klub which was active over many years. And she was one of the net controls for the Indiana Traffic Net and passed many messages in this area.

For a few years she and Dick moved to St. Paul, MN and she had the call WORTH but got her old call back when she returned to Seymour. It was while they were in St. Paul that Dick died of a heart attack. She came back to a telephone job that she had held before they moved and said that was what ruined her hearing.

Many of the hams around Seymour can thank Adah for helping them get their licenses. She would work with anyone that was interested. She was a member of the Seymour Radio Club and loved Field Day. Adah would be at Freeman Field helping to set up on Saturday and operated until time for her to go to work, then about 4AM she would be back operating until time to quit. She also laughed about incidents that happened like the State Police calling and telling her that she was coming in on their radio. She lived two blocks from the State Post. Several of the young hams laughed when they heard her coming over the church speakers one Sunday.

Over the years she added QCWA, Quarter Century Wireless Association to her list of clubs as well as QCWW, Quarter Century Wireless Women, and OOTC, the Old Old Timers Club.

Adah and I went to many ham conventions all over the country and made the Dayton Hamvention when it was still held in a downtown hotel and several times later.

When Adah moved to Franklin to the Masonic Home, she took her rig with her. She had an antenna for 40 meters and checked into the Indiana Traffic Net whenever possible. She still held her license and was proud of W9RTH. When I would visit her she would tell me to remind her when she needed to renew her license.

The Ham Community has lost a wonderful Amateur Radio Operator. We'll miss hearing your call, Adah.

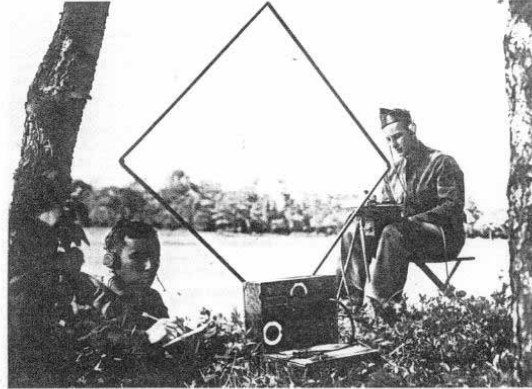
In the September 1994 Spark-Gap Times was a little of my communications history. I finally found, thanks to the U.S. Army Signal Corp. Museum at Ft. Gordon, GA., A photo of the SCR-161 like the equipment we used in the Field Artillery in 1938. This equipment, developed in the 1920's, was called "two man portables" and was transported by horse and truck. It was used by the infantry division, ground and air artillery, cavalry division, early armored divisions, costal defense sites and air groups or squadrons. Due to technical differences, patent agreements, political maneuvering and inter-service squabbling, these old sets weren't really replaced, totally, until 1942. The new SCR-600 series of FM stations, all phone, with squelch, were a dream by comparison.

The old SCR - 131-161-171 sets were 2000-6000KC., CW only in the original version. The transmitter was a single type 10 tube oscillator with 7.5 volt filament

and 400 volts plate keying. The tunable series-fed Hartley oscillator fed a field assembled loop antenna for about 15 watts output. No MOPA! Remember the communications mission was very short range - not enough for the enemy to pick up - hopefully. The receiver was 3 type 864 tubes using volts 1.1 filament. One tube was oscillator/detector and two stages of audio amp!

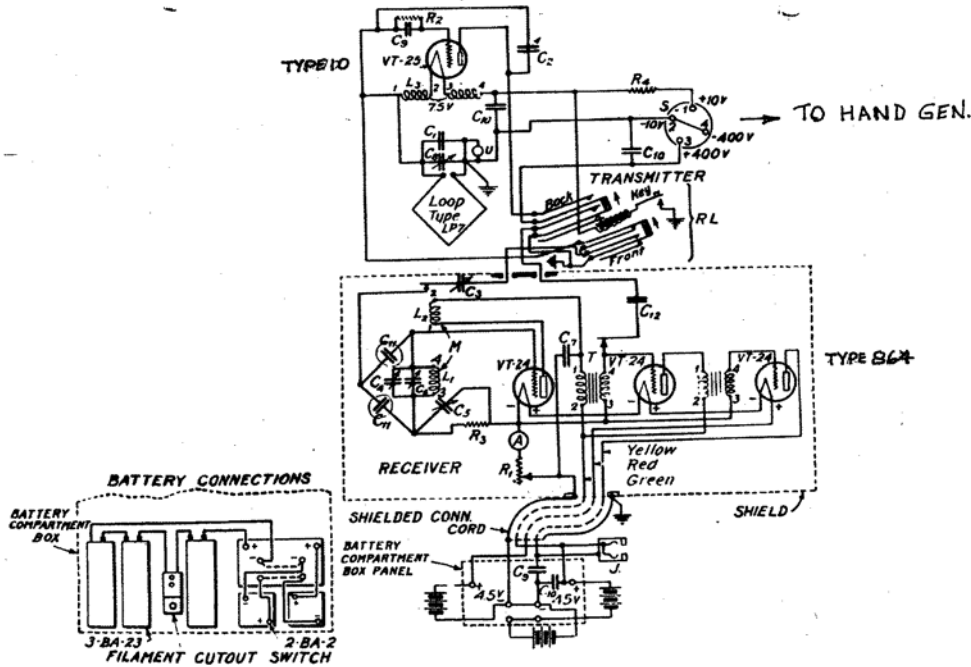

and wife Mary and, of course, our much appreciated Helen Windham (N6ZLL). Members were asked to stand, introduce themselves and their guests. Our nominee for President Paul Schinnerer (AB6TB) filled us in on his background in radio communication.

A TRIBUTE TO CHARLES E. MELLEN, W1FH, #1413, SK 1/21/2006

Back in the 1940's, "ham radio" operator Charles Mellen used his short wave radio to talk to amateur radio operators in essentially every country in the world. Charles was the first recipient of the DXCC award after WWII. This was the coveted award for world-wide contacts, presented by the American Radio Relay League.

W1FH was well known to many of the world's short-wave operators starting in the pre-war days and continuing for almost 50 years. He was a polite and courteous operator and his operating habit was to spend his time listening for rare overseas signals, and his stateside contacts were mostly with acquaintances. He rarely called CQ but it seemed he was always the first to find weak signals and have a cordial chat with the rarest of overseas "DX" stations, and it was always before a radio pile-up would start.

In 1949 Charlie maintained constant radio contact with a British agent named Reginald Fox who was living in the closed country of Tibet. Fox used his "forbidden" wireless set to beam signals over the towering Himalayas, and Charlie was able to continually gather news and information about the Chinese communist invasion and annexation of Tibet, and especially news of the safe escape of the young Dalai Llama who had been deposed.

The information from Charlie was continuously used by the CBS radio news commentator Lowell Thomas. Charlie had received thank-you letters from both Lowell Thomas Senior and Junior. Ironically, during the late forties, I was the studio engineer that handled the "live" nightly Lowell Thomas news program that was rebroadcast over short wave station WRUL!

Charles, as he preferred to be called, was of Greek descent and maintained weekly amateur radio schedules for over 20 years with his very close ham friend in London, Norman Jolly, G3FNJ. As is typical in ham radio, they had never met in person! When my wife (G3YL) and I were in London, we had a very enjoyable visit with Norman Jolly and another distinguished gentleman, who was the chief British intelligence Officer in Greece during World War II.

When I was a young High School student after WWII, it was fascinating to tune in on Charlie as he talked to countries that I never heard of! I admired Charlie, and it was in the 70's when I visited Charlie's DX station in the West Roxbury section of Boston. He had an ordinary set-up using 600 watts and a 3-element beam.

I always appreciated learning that what counted for his far reaching radio contacts was lots of patient listening - and far less talking!

Regretfully, Charlie's major heart surgery had long kept him inactive on the short wave radio, and he passed away in January 2006 at the ripe old age of 91.

THRILL FOR A NEW HAM - by Bill Engs W6TCY engs@juno.com

It all started in the summer of 1946. Two teenagers, my friend, Gil and I, had been experimenting with a private telephone scheme and listening to radio broadcasts with crystal detectors. One day we spotted an article in *Popular Science*, "Listen In on the Hams with this One Tube Superregenerative Receiver." We were fascinated and decided to build our own sets. We conned our fathers (who worked in New York City) to buy us the components at one of the shops on Courtlandt Street (years later the street was demolished to make room for the World Trade Center). Any radio or audio part could be bought there.

Soon each of us had constructed his own set; parts wired together on a "bread-board with controls mounted on a front panel. It used a Type 37 tube, and it was powered by an "A" battery and a "B" battery (common in those days for portable radios.). We already had the military surplus headphones.

When I fired up my set, I didn't hear anything for a while, then, all of a sudden heard a short wave broadcast station. It was playing songs from "Annie Get Your Gun." That was not what I wanted to hear, so I shortened the coil to bring me up to the 10 meter ham band. There they were-- local hams; W2QLZ, W2MXK and others---on ground wave. I did "listen in," and after a few months, at age 14, I decided to get my FCC license and become one of them. (Gil went on to other things.)

A bit later, I was introduced to George, W2BP, in Rye. After visiting him and seeing his station in action, he let me borrow his old Hallicrafters SX-16 communications receiver. What a break.

Now I was able to study the International Morse Code. I listened and learned the characters and, writing everything down, gradually increased my speed.

One day, I saw smoke coming out of the SX-16! I was horrified. Later I found out a condenser had gone bad causing a resistor to over heat. Replacing the condenser solved the problem.

At the time I was living in the unfinished attic of our house. My father and I built a bed room for me at one end. I constructed a ham shack, including the electrical wiring, at the other end. To outfit the shack, I built a long radio operating table and work bench using scrap lumber scrounged from the apartments they were building nearby.

In Spring of 1947, I was ready to take the FCC test, both code, and written parts. Applicants had to send and receive 13 words a minute, and they had to pass the code test before the written test was administered. I had never skipped school. But on this important day, I took off from high school and rode the train to New York City. I took the subway to the building where

the FCC office was located. The test setting was kind of intimidating. I failed the code test. For the next six months, I practiced code. By October, I was ready. I skipped another day of school. On the re-test, I passed! In a few weeks I received my Class B ticket with the station call letters, W2WLY.

To become active, I built a 6V6 crystal oscillator transmitter for 80 meters. It checked out OK, but I had difficulty mastering the skill of antenna loading. For two months, I failed to get on the air.

(Narrative from my early days follows.)

On Friday night, January 16, 1948, I was playing around with my one tube transmitter when I found to my surprise that I could light a bulb quite brightly by moving the link to the opposite end, the antenna end [of the coil]. There was also another characteristic, there was an even greater rise in the [plate] current when the rig was tuned to a certain point, but the bulb went out. The next morning W1FPS called and said he would listen for me while I made various adjustments. I did not find till later which was my best--only that I had been heard. I was very much thrilled. Finding out later which was best, I decided to go on the air. I was slowed down because the [telegraph] key broke down, and I took time out to fix the blasted thing. Then I was ready.

The day was Saturday, January 17. At 6:30 PM. I called W3IMA, but nothing happened. I called W2WXN and no reply. Then along about 7, I called W1FOO. He came back. This is the never to be forgotten moment that we amateurs have when we have nailed our first station. I was surprised, horrified, and delighted all at the same time. He was in Hartford and the conditions were bad. I got RST 569x. I was shaking. My heart was pounding heavily, and it was the greatest moment. I had conquered the ham band. I called and called all the evening, but there was no come back, and as I said, conditions were bad. I wasn't disappointed, but pleased. A new ham was on the air. I was age 15. I continue the hobby to this day.
